3. Preparedness and Mitigation Objective(s):

- Identify and map on GIS mapping layers critical infrastructure, residences and other critical assets located within flood plains which may be impacted by rapidly rising spring run-off throughout Delta County;
- Establish a Unified Coordination Team to serve as an incident management team and staff for the Delta County Emergency Operations Center to lead and coordinate response efforts to flooding within Delta County both in unincorporated areas as well as municipalities.
- Identify and provide basic training to staff from cross-disciplines and jurisdictions to fill roles in the EOC structure to provide critical staffing support in a virtual and/or physical EOC to ensure response objectives and planning are completed;
- Identify jurisdictions and positions/individuals with the authority to serve in an Incident Command Structure related to spring flooding;
- Identify common trigger points for activation of response assets based on developing or anticipated situations and weather;
- Develop a plan for public awareness education and distribute outreach materials to residents for flood mitigation;
- Ensure a uniform concept of operations across jurisdictions and identify jurisdictional authority and responsibilities
- Assist Emergency Management in consequence management planning
- Develop an Coordination Planning Team meeting schedule and format so all jurisdictions including DHSEM, the State EOC, CO Department of Corrections and other agencies are updated on current and developing situation in Delta County
- Identify and prioritize a list of resource needs within jurisdictions and identify a logistics team to help fill and track those resource requests.

4. Operational Period Command Emphasis:

- Priority is identifying team members for unified coordination, resource gaps and needs, gathering data from our partners at the National Weather Service, US Geological Survey, NRCS and others about potential stream and river flows and their expected impacts to Delta County.
- Spring snow-melt flooding is complex in nature and right now we have a lot of unknowns. The emphasis now needs to be on preparedness and
 mitigation and identifying those areas where jurisdictions can deploy low-cost resources to mitigate impacts of possible flood waters and
 protect life and property.
- Identification of trigger points by the Coordination/Planning team will be critical to developing future Incident Support Plans to support planning and response to spring run-off flooding in Delta County.


General Situational Awareness

Western Colorado has received record snowfall over the 2022-2023 winter and the Lower Gunnison River Basin which most of Delta County sits in is sitting at 201% of the 1991-2020 average. Additionally, the Uncompandere Drainage which feeds the Uncompandere River and the Ridgway Reservoir is at 135% of average. Record snowfall in the mountains means a rapid warm up will cause rivers, streams and ditches to swell this spring and cause localized to widespread flooding in lower valleys.








NRCS Snowtel Maps – Snow Water Equivalent Percentages from 1991-2020 by Basin




Lower Gunnison Basin Snow Water Equivalent as of 4-5-2023 202% of Median

- Establish sandbag distribution points for Unincorporated Delta County and Municipalities as Directed

- Review berms at Wastewater Treatment Facilities in Delta County and deploy resources as needed to fortify/increase height of berms to prevent wastewater breach into waterways.

COMMUNITY LIFELINE REPORTING – CHANGES TO LIFINES REQUIRE NOTIFICATION TO STATE EOC

The Delta County Emergency Operations Plan (EOP) references the FEMA Community Lifelines as adopted by FEMA in 2019. Departments, agencies and staff should report threats and impacts to the communities to lifelines when reporting conditions. Emergency Management is responsible for reporting situation reports to the CO Division of Homeland Security & Emergency Management (DHSEM) via WebEOC and to the State EOC. These reports monitor the lifeline status in each county. Below is a quick summary of the lifelines and how to report a change in a status.















FEMA COMMUNITY LIFELINES

Unified Command Staff, Staff working in the EOC and Agencies should report lifeline status to Emergency Management on a Daily Basis when the EOC is activated at a Level 3 or higher. To determine the status of a community lifeline, agency administrators, incident/unified command and/or EOC staff should ask:

LIFELINE ASSESSMENT	
Status	What is going on?
Impact	What is going to happen as a result of this impact?
Actions	What do we need to do now?
Limiting Factors	What's the Gap?
ETA To Green?	How long will it take to restore?

Based on the answers to these questions determines if the lifeline is:

STATUS UNKNOWN	The extent of a disruption and impacts to a lifeline is unknown and will be reported at a later time.
STABLE	The lifeline services are not impacted, have been stabilized or re-established. Note – Lifelines may still be green but still have components/subcomponents which are severely impacted.
FUNCTIONAL but inadequate for consistent service	Lifeline components/subcomponents are disrupted but a solution is in progress and an estimated time to stabilization of the lifeline has been identified.
UNSTABLE, inadequate level of service	Lifeline services are disrupted and NO solution has been identified or is in progress. This lifeline is unstable and impacting residents.

TRIGGER POINTS FOR EOC ACTIVATION AND RESOURCE MOBILIZATION

The following trigger points have been tentatively identified for activation of response assets related to spring flooding in Delta County this year. These trigger points will need to be flushed out further by the Coordination team and staff within departments such as Engineering, Public Works, Public Safety, 911 Communications, etc. These trigger points are meant to serve as common points where all agencies will know what actions are to be taken if a defined threshold is met and don't define every situation that may occur but are meant to identify actions that can be taken by this team to protect property and public safety.



Normal Response - Internal Operations - EOC Remains in Monitoring State

- Streams/ditches/local rivers flowing near capacity but no local flooding occurring
- Standing water or minor flooding in localized areas within the floodplain
- Minor debris flows in ditches/creeks/rivers that is building up on bridges or culverts and can be removed with equipment safely
- Water flowing in ditches along roadways but is not eroding road surface or impacting travel
- Debris on roadways or in minor ditches that could cause issues but public works crews can safely access and remove without specialized resources or equipment



Normal Response - EOC activated to Level 3 Command Activation for Virtual Operations/Monitoring

- Reports of water damaging road surface or structure and public works/road & bridge crews have to restrict traffic
- Moderate road damage which leads to road damage and travel impacts for citizens requiring PIO message coordination and public alert dissemination advising of road closure/detours.
- Minor emergency road repairs



Unified Response - Incident Command Established - Level 2 Partial EOC Activation - Virtual and/or In-Person

- Road becomes damaged blocking access to residential area where residents are or may become trapped and need fire department rescue
- Report of structural damage to a bridge or collapse of a culvert that leads to a full road closure and no ability to repair due to flood waters
- Localized flooding is impacting residences and requires activation of volunteers and resources to protect structures from flood waters
- Flood water threatening damage to critical infrastructure requiring activation of resources for protective efforts
- Flood waters have reached ____ stage and have passed the identified trigger points on the priority bridges identified in this ISP
 - Once ___ stage has been reached on a bridge, the bridge should be immediately closed and Command team notified for a
 coordination call as soon as possible to discuss impacts and next steps.



<u> Unified Command Established – Level 1 Full EOC Activation – In Person</u>

- Flood waters have breached levies, mitigation/retainment structures or are overtopping a bridge requiring a closure of a roadway
- Flood waters have reached ___ level at the Cottonwood Creek Bridge at Lockhart Road and/or ____ level at the Sawmill Mesa Rd Roubideau Creek Bridge threatening access to the Delta Correctional Center (DCC).
- Delta Correctional Center Staff notify command of the decision to evacuate inmates from Correctional Center or shelter in place
- Notification from the National Weather Service of extended period of warming and excessive snowmelt which is likely to cause a surge in waterways across Delta County and localized flooding impacting residents in 2+ jurisdictions
- Flooding which closes a major roadway such as U.S. 50, Hwy 92, Surface Creek Road, G50 Road, etc
- Flooding near residences requiring evacuation of residents and activation of the Delta County Alerts and Activation of a Wireless Emergency Alert
- Flooding which is occurring in multiple jurisdictions impacting multiple agencies and overwhelming available staff and resources which requires specialized resources and or consideration of an emergency declaration by any jurisdiction.

INFRASTRUCTURE MONITORING - PRIORITIES

A critical component of this plan and reason for coordination amongst jurisdictions in response to possible spring flooding is to take steps to mitigate the impacts to infrastructure including local, county and state-owned bridges, culverts, and major water diversions and other infrastructure that may be located within the floodway of waterways in Delta County.

Through coordination meetings with stakeholders, Delta County Emergency Management and Commissioners have identified the following infrastructure as priority to protecting through mitigation efforts.

BRIDGES

DELTA AREA

- 1. 25 Mesa Road- Roubideau Creek Bridge Delta County
- 2. Lockhart Road Cottonwood Creek Bridge entering Delta Correctional Center Delta County
- 3. Sawmill Mesa Road Roubideau Creek Delta County

DISASTER DECLARATION PROCESS

Below is an excerpt from the 2021 Adopted Delta County Emergency Operations Plan as a reminder of the Disaster Declaration process.

- 1) County agency or emergency response agency with jurisdiction (i.e. Fire District, Sheriff's Office, Health Department, EMS, Colorado State Patrol) takes command or unified command is established.
- 2) If incident starts on or involves State or Federal lands, the agency administrator/representative with command over the land (i.e. U.S. Forest Service, Bureau of Land Management, CO Parks and Wildlife, etc) takes command or has voice in Unified Command.
- 3) Wildfires on U.S. Forest Service and BLM Land are handled per the County AOP and Federal direction. Refer to the AOP for guidance on Wildfires related to fire districts, unincorporated Delta County in land Controlled by the Sheriff/County and State responsibility fires.
- 4) If incident is expanding and appears likely to last more than one operational period, a damage assessment and complexity analysis is completed. County EOP is activated per this plan. Depending on severity of incident the EOC may be activated per this plan.
- 5) Is incident exceeding local resources?

- i. Local agency or agencies with jurisdiction continue to manage the incident until resolved and recovery process is started.

- i. Local Delta County Mutual Aid resources are activated.

- 8) If conditions for a County Declaration are met, the procedure as outlined in Section 12.4 should be followed. Declaration is then filed by OEM with the County Clerk and Regional Field Manager at DHSEM and state assistance is requested.
- 9) DHSEM Director and Staff are updated and depending on incident, State EOP may be activated.
- 10) For major incidents, state EOP and State EOC are activated and damage assessments are completed. Incident delegation of authority is completed based upon this plan and level of incident.
- 11) If a major incident (Type II or Type I), DHSEM and State will complete damage assessments with FEMA Region VIII and Governor will make request to FEMA and the President for a Presidential Disaster Declaration if the incident is exceeding the state's ability to respond and federal assistance is needed.
- 12) FEMA Region VIII administrator reviews and makes recommendation to FEMA administrator who then makes recommendation to the President.
- 13) If federal criteria are met per the Stafford Act, the President issues a Presidential Disaster Declaration per the Stafford Act for Federal Assistance.
